The History of the Center



In 1983, Sr.
Margarita Navarro
CSJ, originally of
Cincinnati, OH, and
Fr. Angel Torrellas,
OP, a missionary from
Spain, came from their
prior work in Mexico
to volunteer in a poor

community in Managua, Nicaragua called Batahola Norte, a barrio of about 5,000 residents. They began a humble mission, visiting homes, starting simple sewing and music classes along with basic literacy instruction. Their mission in a single room structure has grown into an oasis of classrooms, gardens, music and colorful wall murals in the midst of profound poverty where, currently, 76% of Nicaraguans live on less than \$2 a day. The center's impact in the barrio of Batahola includes new sources of income for women and their families, a reduction in violent attitudes in families and in increased participation of men in parenting. Educational, cultural and faith based opportunities have helped to build dignity in the people it serves, creating good citizens as well as community leaders.

Who We Serve

Women (almost 700) make up about 75% of the adult student body. Men, women and children of all ages can enjoy the use of the library for homework, research, and reading for pleasure. Nearly 1000 children have learned about human rights, the environment and teamwork through reading achievement activities.

Over 250 children and youth have participated in the Youth Arts Groups and Cultural Development program. Young leaders have organized and promoted violence prevention activities throughout the barrio of Batahola and beyond to other neighborhoods.



The Center's Focus

Our work is organized around four strategic program areas:

Education and Training Program. Where poverty and violence hold so many back from reaching their full potential, we believe that learning new skills creates a necessary path to economic independence and personal development. This program offers over 15 courses in basic adult education and vocational/technical training.



Friends of Batahola (English) Centro Cultural Batahola Norte (Spanish) Educational Support for Children and Youth. Barriers to education abound in Nicaragua, and we believe that education is the key to breaking generational cycles of poverty and violence.



Through individual scholarships and a community library, this program supports vulnerable children, teens and their families, so that students enroll and succeed in school.

Youth Arts Groups and Cultural Promotion.

Nicaraguan schools provide few or no opportunities for creative development, a process that is essential to the growth and resilience of young people. This program offers instructional classes in drawing, painting, drama, music and dance.

It also organizes youth performing arts groups and provides a space where the local community has access to cultural activities and exchanges.

Gender and Generational Violence
Prevention Program. Domestic violence is
alarmingly common in Nicaragua. We believe
everyone has the right to live free of violence, so this
program works to prevent violence against women



and children, empowering individuals and communities to reduce risk factors for violence and identify and escape violent situations.
