Since taking the Pastry course at the Center, Yahaira, Elizabeth and Jenny have managed to overcome their fears to offer their products. One of the people they

thank for encouraging them to start their business was their teacher Marcia Santamaría.


In 2003, Pat joined the Friends of Batahola (FOB) Board of Directors and continued volunteering with the

Karen expresses her deep gratitude to the Center, where she found support to guide her throughout her journey. "The psychologist helped me a lot because my father had passed away and



I wanted to be able to talk and open up to someone in confidence," Karen expressed.
