IHM's Twinning Partnership With the Cultural Center of Batahola Norte

The Cultural Center of Batahola Norte was founded in 1983 by Fr. Angel Torrellas, a missionary from Spain, and Sr. Margie Navarro, CSJ, who grew up in Mt. Washington, graduated from St. Joseph Academy (now Archbishop McNicholas High School) and served a short time as principal of Immaculate Heart of Mary School. From its humble beginnings, the Center has grown to offer 20 courses to more than 1,000 students each year.

Today, the Center focuses on four program areas:

- Education and vocational training programs for adults,
- Educational support for children and youth,
- Youth arts groups and cultural promotion, and
- Gender and generational violence prevention programs.

The mission of the Center is to live a humane and just lifestyle with preference for the poor and according to the Gospel to help transform society into the Kingdom of God. Joining in this mission, in 2000, IHM established a twinning relationship with the Center.

Project Education for Batahola

IHM's Project Education for Batahola student sponsorship program, which began in 2005, provides an opportunity to connect with members of our twinning community on a personal and meaningful level. The scholarships that are made available through Project Education are life transforming. The program helps keep students in school longer, which translates into greater lifetime opportunities, reduced poverty, and reduced domestic violence. Women make up about 75 per cent of the adult student body. Over 225 students receive scholarships from IHM parishioners each year.
